An apprenticeship in the Building Materials sector is a great opportunity to jumpstart or advance your career, while earning money and gaining vital experience. With a variety of programmes available, there's something to suit everyone.

Unlike regular academic levels, apprenticeships have their own system: Intermediate, Advanced, Higher, and Degree. It's like levelling up in a game, but for your career.

There are lots of different courses for different types of people, at all skills levels and stages of career – the best approach is to seek a course that is most appropriate to you and your goals.

Apprenticeships are suitable to anyone looking to fast-track their career or learn a new role. Each Apprenticeship uses government approved standards and are delivered by industry competent coaches to deliver the exact knowledge, skills and behaviours required in this ever-changing sector.

Apprentices spend 80% of their working week 'doing the job' and the rest of the time either work shadowing, online learning, attending regional workshops and individual coaching sessions or on assignment/project work.

So, seize this amazing opportunity to get paid, feel empowered, grow your confidence and excel in your career.

2. College

College is an alternative to sixth form for students who have completed their GCSEs in Year 11. It's like sixth form but in a totally different place, with new faces and friends to make.

Learning takes place in classrooms and practical environments with opportunities for industry placements. You can get some hands-on experience, but you won't get paid like you would on an apprenticeship.

Each course does have entry requirements which usually include Maths and English GCSEs. So, if you didn't quite make it in your GCSEs, additional learning can be sorted out for you at College so you can get your grades.

Colleges tend to offer A levels, NVQs, Diplomas and Foundation Learning and loads offer construction training and academic courses. Which is a useful starting point for a career in Building Materials.

Once the course is finished you have further opportunities to go to university, start an apprenticeship or employment. If employment is your next step, due to lack of experience the role will be entry level and further training may be required. But it does mean you will start earning.

The world of work can be daunting, but Building Materials employers are looking forward to welcoming new people from all ages and skills levels. The sector is known for its open and supportive culture.

Until the age of 18 you must

- Stay in full-time education, for example at a college;
- · Start an apprenticeship or
- Spend 20+ hours a week working or volunteering, while in part time education or training.

Going into the world of work with no experience or a qualification i.e. apprenticeship or other formal training programme, means a likelihood of starting at the bottom and working up. However, it doesn't mean you won't get a job, because employers are also looking for great personalities with ambition and drive, so show them what you are made of. Plus, a bit of hard work never hurt anyone, just ask Sir Richard Branson.

When you start your job your employers will provide an induction, health and safety, other essential training, suitable supervision and Personal Protective Equipment (PPE).

You must be at least school leaving age to get paid the National Minimum Wage and aged 23 to receive the National Living Wage.

After Further Education, if you've rocked those A-Levels, BTECs, HNCs, or HNDs, you can level up with University Higher education!

Learning is in classrooms and practical settings, and some courses even hook you up with industry placements. Just remember Degree Apprenticeships? They're like the cool exception to the rule!

Now, here's the deal with universities – each one's got its own entry requirements. Usually, they're all about certain A-Level grades or UCAS Tariff points. But don't stress, just check what your dream uni wants!

Universities offer loads of construction related courses, which are a useful starting point for a role in Building Materials.

It's worth researching some Building Materials employers to see who might be offering employer sponsorships. That could mean getting financial help.

If employment is your next step, the roles may vary from entry level to higher depending on the connection to your degree and further training may be required. But it does mean you will start earning. So, if you're ready to take your skills to the next level, dive into the world of University Higher education.

Graduate Scheme

If you've completed your degree and are looking to secure your place in the world of work, it's worth researching graduate scheme opportunities.

A graduate scheme gives you:

- · hands-on experience of different areas of a company
- a chance for you to follow a structured training programme
- a route to develop your talent as a future leader at a company

Graduate schemes generally last from 1 to 4 years.

The recruitment cycle starts from the summer onwards each year. You'll find a lot of graduate schemes advertised between September and November.

Some companies will recruit all year round. Smaller employers will often recruit when a position becomes available.

Entry requirements: You'll usually need at least a 2:1 (upper second-class honours) to get a place on a graduate scheme. Some will allow a 2:2 (lower second-class honours) if you show potential and have a good CV.

Some companies only recruit recent graduates. Others will consider anyone with a degree.
